First, a Social Justice Grounding. <3

I wanted to name that 2023 was heavy, and my heart hurts from the injustices that have defined the year:

- The 30,000+ (and rising) number of Palestinian people killed in Gaza by the far-right Zionist Israeli government (funded by the U.S. and other countries), the thousands of Palestinians unjustly imprisoned in Israeli jails, and the continued apartheid that touches the West Bank and all Palestinian people.
- The estimated 1200 Israelis and Foreign Nationals (who were killed in a Hamas-led attack on Oct 7th, 2023), the individuals who are still held hostage in Gaza, and the emotional toll this has had on Jewish folks and the families of the foreign nationals caught in the crossfire.
- The decades-long humanitarian crisis happening in Congo. And how the U.S. (and other rich countries) benefit from Congo's rich natural resources to the detriment of the Congolese people.
 - And honestly, so many other African countries are in similar situations, many of which are a result of the historical impacts of settler colonialism.
- The estimated 100,000+ Ukrainians killed and displaced by the Russian Government
- The many other countries and peoples where displacement due to humanitarian crises and environmental disaster are ever present, such as Afghanistan, Syria, Myanmar, Pakistan, Venezuela, Haiti, the Uighurs in China, and more.
- And, of course, the continued oppressive systems in place that continue to negatively impact the lives of Black, Indigenous, Latine, Asian, Arab, and other people of color in the USA (and beyond).

Why am I writing this in my outgoing president's letter?

It is Because We Are All Connected

We, as evaluators, are people, and as people, we are all interconnected. When there is an injustice, we all get hurt. And those impacts ripple across geography and time. If you don't feel the hurt, perhaps it is because the privileges you hold allow you to disconnect from that human connection. And if that resonates, take this opportunity to reflect and take meaningful action to reignite that sacred connection we all share.

I felt inspired to write this because of MNEA's new vision statement, which is: *The Minnesota Evaluation Association (MNEA) envisions a collaborative community where evaluators help build a more just and equitable society to ensure the liberation of all.*

As evaluators, we sometimes find ourselves in places of power. Either in the process of data analysis, writing reports, or being in a room where decisions are being made that will directly impact vulnerable communities. It is during these times of power and influence where it is essential we don't forget our shared humanity.

I invite you to help make MNEA a more collaborative community, where evaluators can work together to build a more just and equitable society.
